

The Invitatory and Psalter



Christ being raised from the dead will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death that he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So also consider yourselves dead to sin, and alive to God in Jesus Christ our Lord. Alleluia.

You, my child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High, for you will go before the Lord to prepare his way, To give his people knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of their sins. The Third Lesson

John 20:1-18

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes. But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him

away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Or any other silly thing you can think of to celebrate that the Lord is Risen!


Please drive slowly and carefully!

The whole congregation is invited to drive through the parking lot between 1:30pm and 2pm on Easter Sunday. When you do that (*slowly and carefully*), you'll be able to wave at your Priest - and more importantly - at the Easter Bunny. Circle a few times. Come in our entrance, drive down the lot, go out our exit. Then come back around once or twice. In the process, you might also get to wave at some other friends and neighbors of yours. *And maybe we'll have another surprise or two*. Here's the important safety piece: everyone must stay in their cars and keep the windows rolled up. We need to comply with all safety ordinances and not put anyone at risk, so please, stay in the car, keep the windows rolled up. After you've waved and said a safe hello, go home and enjoy the rest of your day. This morning: gather a few pictures of people you'd like to be celebrating with, and put them on your altar. Gather, too, some tokens or memories of people you love who are now alive in the Lord. Then go outside and gather some flowers for your altar.


